ABSTRACT

A study of newspaper advertisements was conducted to determine the location of Charleston's commercial activity for the antebellum period. Newspaper ads for the years 1800-1860 were examined and the names and addresses of merchants and craftsmen were recorded. These data were compared to those of the eighteenth century and to those contained in other sources. Locations of merchants and craftsmen are compared, and these locations are compared to those of the eighteenth century. The changing location of the commercial core reflects the physical and economic development of the city. The present study was funded by a Community Development Grant for the City of Charleston and a matching Historic Preservation Grant from the Department of the Interior, administered by the South Carolina Department of Archives and History, in compliance with the National Historic Preservation Act of 1966, as amended.

CHAPTER I

INTRODUCTION AND BACKGROUND

The historical importance of the city of Charleston has long been recognized, by both scholars and laymen, residents and visitors alike. From the founding of the Carolina colony through the Civil War years, Charleston played a central role in the political, social and economic development of the United States. Less than sixty years after its founding in 1670, Charleston was one of the few viable urban centers in the southern colonies. Charleston's economic growth continued through the colonial and federal periods, and by the early nineteenth century Charleston was the major port city of the southeast. In contrast to these "golden years" (Rogers 1980), Charleston was left behind by the development of inland, railroad transportation. Her economic stagnation in the nineteenth century led to a decline in new construction and development, thus preventing the razing of older structures that usually accompanies such activities.

With the economic resurgence following World War II, Charlestonians realized the historical value of the city's architecture and worked to integrate preservation with development. Charleston attracted national attention in 1931 when the city adopted a zoning ordinance which established and protected an Old and Historic District (Stoney 1944). Today Charleston remains a leader in adaptive reuse, compatible new construction, and historic preservation.

With such enthusiasm for, and attention to, architectural preservation, it is not surprising that the City of Charlston has begun to support research on and preservation of the city's archaeological resources with equal enthusiasm. Archaeological investigations are now routinely conducted as part of any development project involving the many Urban Development Action Grants awarded to the City (Zierden et al. 1983a, 1983b, n.d., Herold 1981), and private developers have begun to contract for archaeological investigations and to utilize the resulting information in interpretation of their properties (Zierden et al 1983c; Zierden et al, 1984). Archaeological research is now viewed as an important tool for providing an alternate interpretation of Charleston's past.

A milestone in the development of an ongoing archaeological research program for the City of Charleston was the preparation of an archaeological research design for the city. In order to more efficiently integrate archaeological research with the development plans for downtown Charleston, the City of Charleton contracted the Charleston Museum to study the documentary record pertaining to the development of Charleston and to prepare an Archaeological Preservation Plan to guide future investigations in the city. The project was funded by two Community Development Grants and research was begun in August 1981.

As research progressed, it was realized that an extensive investigation of Charleston newspapers would be an integral, if not innovative, part of this study. An investigation of colonial newspapers, specifically the South Carolina Gazette, was initiated in 1982. This project provided valuable insights into the commercial landscape of eighteenth century Charleston, and growth and development trends during this period (Calhoun et al. 1982). This project also indicated that continuing the investigation into the nineteenth century would prove equally fruitful. This project, the results of which are outlined in this report, was designed to continue the study by examining newspaper ads from 1800 to 1860. This report is the third of four reports resulting from the overall documentary study. This broad documentary study forms the foundation of the Charleston Museum's urban archaeology program.

Historical Documents and Urban Archaeology

Urban archaeology is one of the most recent developments in historical archaeology, recognized as a special area for less than ten years. Although the definitions of urban and urban archaeology are as diverse as the practicioners of the discipline, the definitions proposed by Staski (1982:97) will be used here. Urban archaeology is defined as the study of relationships between material culture, human behavior, and cognition in an urban setting. An urban setting is defined as a permanent location in which the density of settlement and the amount of human energy expended per unit of land are greater than in the surrounding region. An urban center, or city, is a sociopolitical entity that exhibits the characteristics of an urban setting. In other words, the urban archaeologist studies societies from any time and located at any place where concentrations of people and energy are or were present.

When the United States were first being peopled by immigrants from Europe in the sixteenth, seventeenth, and eighteenth centuries, these people brought with them the tradition of an urban-based society. Colonial proprietors encouraged the development of urban centers for protection, community, and commerce (Brownell and Goldfield 1977; Mohl and Betten 1970). Although the efforts of the proprietors met with mixed success, with commercially profitable towns and cities more prevalent in northern colonies than in southern, urban centers played an important role in the development of American life. It is for this reason that the archaeological study of cities is important. As the largest, and one of the few, colonial urban centers in the southeast, exploration of urban life in Charleston is essential to a greater understanding of the development of the southeastern United States.

Many of the colonial towns served as important social, political, and commercial centers for abbreviated hinterlands, but are not, or were not, large enough to be considered cities. Nonetheless, it was in the studies of such settlements as Williamsburg, Virginia (Noel Hume 1963), St. Mary's City, Maryland (Miller 1983), and St. Augustine, Florida (Deagan 1983) that the theory and techniques of urban archaeology developed. It was also

through these programs that the discipline began to be "archaeology of the city" instead of "archaeology in the city' (Staski 1982). Researchers in these areas began to address such problems of urban development as social stratification and specialization (Deagan 1974, 1983; Miller 1983; Outlaw et al. 1977) and urban spatial patterning (Outlaw 1975; Miller 1983). These projects were also the origin of many techniques for dealing with the practical and logistical problems of studying the urban site (Deagan 1981; Deagan et al. 1976).

The decade of the 1970's saw an increase in the number of archaeological studies in large urban centers as a result of the mandates of federal regulations, but also reflecting the trend of federal involvement in urban renewal, a trend that has certainly brought changes to downtown Charleston. Such large scale construction projects as block large, multi-story buildings (Rothschild and Rockman 1983; Honerkamp et al. 1982; Honerkamp et al. 1983) or entire subway systems (Dickens and Bowen 1980) entailed the destruction of major portions of sites in the city. Because urban archaeological research was new to most of these cities, there was little time for total mitigation, much less completion of city-wide historical research. As a result, sites were studied in isolation; the individual site was treated as the unit of study, rather than the urban center of which the site in question was merely a part (Zierden 1984b).

Researchers in Alexandria, Virginia, were the first to recognize the city as a whole as the logical unit of research, and to implement a long term research program of the city. Dubbed the city-site approach by Cressey and Stephens (1983), the program involves long term historical research, archaeological testing, and data recovery. In the Alexandria program, as here in Charleston, the foundation of the research was an extensive, though selective, study of the documentary record (Cressey and Stephens 1983; Zierden and Calhoun 1984).

The major difference between historical archaeology and prehistoric archaeology is that written records are available for the populations being studied. Therefore, it is not unexpected that detailed documentary studies are an integral part of urban archaeological research. A major advantage, but also a problem, in urban studies is the wealth of documentary information available to the archaeologist. Staski notes that record keeping is an important part of administrative services, and that urban centers traditionally have the facilities for long term collection of these documents; thus the urban center is the repository of a wealth of pertinent documentary information (Staski 1982:10). Although a quantity of such data is generally considered an advantage, the sheer volume and complexity of the material available for the urban center can be overwhelming. In fact, the drawbacks and advantages of the documentary record are similar to those of the archaeological record; both are often extremely complex, with a large number of variables to be controlled, and both experience disorganization through time (Honerkamp and Council 1984:2). For this reason, it is essential that the urban archaeologist use the expertise of a consulting historian, rather than attempt the historical research alone.

The most effective means for utilizing the vast documentary record of the city is to prepare a general, city-wide study, focusing on those aspects of the documentary record pertinent to the archaeological record (Deagan 1984; Cressey et al. 1983; Zierden and Calhoun 1984; see Deagan 1983). Still others have called for more explicit and sophisticated uses of the documentary record (Dickens 1984; Zierden 1984a; Wise 1984). Dickens suggests that a better knowledge of the range of existing documents, both primary and secondary, a more critical evaluation of these documents, and a more creative approach to integrating them into our archaeological work will aid in correcting naive assumptions about material-behavioral relationships in the urban area. The present newspaper study is part of the Charleston Museum's attempt to utilize the documentary record in an innovative and more thorough manner.

At the initiation of the research, it was felt that a thorough investigation of the documentary record would be the best way to survey the archaeological potential of the entire city. As demonstrated by studies in Charleston and elsewhere, a thorough examination of the documentary record can facilitate formulation of models of land use, spatial patterning and social stratification. Of particular interest was a more complete understanding of the location of commercial activities in Charleston; a study of newspaper ads was expected to provide specific information on Charleston's commercial activities and to help place these activities within a larger perspective. It was also expected to augment and test information obtained from more traditional sources. With this basic understanding, archaeological investigations in Charleston need not be site specific, but may instead be viewed as contributing to broader, more general research endeavors. The ultimate goal of the archaeological research program is to understand the place of Charleston in the maritime-agrarian system, in which it was responding to changes within the larger, plantationbased system. The present study of the newspaper advertisements is viewed as a step in bringing us closer to that goal. The problems that plague documentary and archaeological research in the urban setting also occur with the present study; the data base was large and complex, and a number of variables were present. Methods for effectively sampling this data base and controlling the variables are outlined below.

Project Background

In an attempt to efficiently integrate the preservation and/or recovery of archaeological resources with the development goals of the city, the Charleston Museum received two grants from the City to prepare an archaeological preservation plan for Charleston. Phase I of this project, from August 1981 to July 1982, was designed to evaluate the archaeological potential of all areas of the peninsular city and to make recommendations to city planners. The goals of Phase I were two-fold:

]) to ascertain on a general level the length and type of ${f a}$ ccupation for all areas of the peninsular city.

2) to pinpoint the location of specific structures, and the remains of specific activities, in the city.

A variety of primary sources were consulted during this phase, including city directories, city yearbooks, family paper collections, Records of the Secretary of the Province, the Shaftsbury papers, and deed transactions on file at the Charleston County RMC Office. Also, numerous plats and maps on file at the Charleston Library Society, South Carolina Historical Society, and RMC office were examined and reproduced to scale. Finally, numerous, secondary sources on Charleston in particular and the southeastern United States in general were consulted. The results of Phase I were outlined in a preliminary report submitted to the City of Charleston (Zierden and Calhoun 1982).

Phase II of the research project was designed to refine and expand the available information on commercial activity and the type and density of occupation in the city for the eighteenth century. Phase II was conducted from July to September 1982, and was funded by a portion of a Community Development Grant and a matching Historic Preservation Grant administered by the South Carolina Department of Archives and History. The focus of Phase II was an intensive survey of eighteenth century newspaper advertisements.

The primary purpose of the research was to determine the location of commercial activities within the eighteenth century city, which was determined by recording the addresses of merchants who advertised in the South Carolina Gazette. Such information allowed us to define the commercial core of the eighteenth century city, and changes in the location and focus of these areas. The data also facilitated a definition of the range of early craft activities and the location of such activities. Recognizing the bias of this approach, that not all merchants and craftsmen living and working in the city chose to, or were able to, advertise, we designed the research to elucidate general trends, rather than to provide an exhaustive list of colonial businessmen (Calhoun et al. 1982).

Because most structures in the colonial period were combination business-residences, the Phase II study provided extensive data on the land use patterns and patterns of growth and development in eighteenth century Charleston. In addition, data was obtained on the range of material culture being imported into Charleston and on shipping activity in the port city. Because of the success of the Phase II study, a continuation of the newspaper research became the focus of Phases III and IV.

Phase III was conducted on a part-time basis from October 1982 to January 1984. This research was funded by a second Community Development Grant from the city. During this time, newspaper advertisements from 1770 to 1800 were examined and recorded. Research also focused on other sources which provided similar types of information to the newspaper ads. Such sources are not available for the eighteenth century but are quite useful for the nineteenth century. In anticipation of the present study, these sources were examined, intorder to augment and test the data obtained from

the newspapers. Other projects of Phase III include an examination of the urban free black community, and a study of nineteenth century municipal services and public works (see Honerkamp and Council 1984).

Phase IV, the present study, was conducted on a part time basis from October 1983 to September 1984. The results of this fourth, and final, phase of this project are outlined in the present report.

Project Methods and Goals

The value of newspaper research for determining occupational and locational trends was amply demonstrated during Phase II (Calhoun et al. 1982). The study resulted in a definition of the core commercial area of the colonial city. Clusters of merchants and craftsmen were located, and major thoroughfares were determined. Unexpected trends such as multiple land use and population movement were noted. The resulting information has important implications for future archaeological investigations.

The present research is designed to provide comparable information for the first half of the nineteenth century. Specifically, the goals of the study are as follows:

- 1) to pinpoint the location of the retail commercial district by recording the advertisements of merchants; to note changes in this location from the eighteenth century, and to thus suggest growth and development trends derived from this information.
- 2) to note the range and location of commercial, industrial, and service/support activities by recording the advertisements of craftsmen and others; to note changes in such locations from the eighteenth century, thus suggesting development trends; to discuss the types of goods and services available in Charleston during this period.
- 3) to compare information derived from the newspaper research with data available from other sources; to use data from all sources to suggest patterns of land use for antebellum Charleston.

The source utilized for the present study was the <u>Charleston Courier</u>, printed consistently throughout the nineteenth century. Although other newspapers were printed and circulated during the antebellum period, the Courier was the largest and most consistent. Therefore, it was expected to best represent the community as a whole. As with the eighteenth century study, the purpose of this project was not to provide an exhaustive list of commercial enterprises, but rather to determine general trends. In keeping with this goal, and because of time constraints, we did not record shipping agents, slave dealers, and real estate transactions.

It was soon determined that the antebellum papers were both larger and more repetitive than those of the colonial era. Because of time and financial constraints, a sampling strategy was implemented. Rather than recording every year of the sixty year study period, two out of every five years were researched. Beginning with 1800, every fifth year was recorded. A random second year was then chosen within each five year period. The following years were recorded:

In addition, because of the repetitive and voluminous nature of the papers, only one day per month was recorded. Six years were, however, recorded in their entirety to serve as a control. These were 1803-1807 and 1820. When tabulated, there is very little discernable difference between the fully recorded and sampled years, in terms of both absolute numbers and relative percentages, suggesting the validity of the sampling strategy. Likewise, the dramatic trends discerned from the data suggest that sampling two of every five years did not affect the results of the study. Further, the sample size of 4800 suggests a further validity to the results obtained here. Nonetheless, future researchers utilizing the data presented here should be aware of the potential biases stemming from the sampling strategy.

All advertisements and other items of interest were recorded on index cards and filed systematically at the Charleston Museum. These cards were then alphabetized for each year and lists prepared for each year. These lists are contained in Appendix II.

As a background for the present study, trends noted for the eighteenth century are reviewed in Chapter II. Chapter III discusses thends derived from the nineteenth century data. The two centuries are compared and contrasted and conclusions are discussed in Chapter IV. Appendix I presents the tabulation of merchants and craftsmen for the interim period, 1770 - 1800.

CHAPTER II

THE DEVELOPMENT OF CHARLESTON AS REFLECTED IN THE SOUTH CAROLINA GAZETTE

In 1670, Charleston was founded on

a point (Albemarle) defended by the main river (the Ashley) with a brooke on one side and inaccessible marsh on the other w all at high tides is ever overflown; joyning itself to the mainland in a small neck not exceeding fiftie yards (Cheeves 1897).

The colonists were dissatisfied with this location, however, and, after some exploration of the surrounding area, drifted towards Oyster Point, (Fig 1) approximately four miles away from the the original site. The leaders of the settlement not only recognized but sanctioned this trend. In December of 1679, the Lord Prorpietors sent word to the governing body of the colony that,

We are informed that the Oyster Point is not only a more convenient place to build a towne on then that formerly pitched on by the first settlers but that also the peoples Inclinations tend thither. Wherefore wee think fitt to let you know that the oyster point is the place wee doe appoint for the port towne of which you are to take notice and call it Charles towne, and order the meetings of the Council to be there held and the Secretarys Registers & Surveyors offices to be kept within that town....


They further instructed the Governor and council of the settlement,

to take care to lay out the Streets broad and in straight lines and that in your Grant of the Towne lotts you doe bound every ones Land towards the Streets in an even line and to suffer no one to incroach with his buildings upon the streets whereby to make them narrower then they were first designed (Salley 1928).

To prevent complications, acreage on the peninsula which had already been claimed by settlers reverted to the colony. Those who lost land by this manuever were compensated with grants in other areas. The three hundred acres extending from Oyster Point to what is now Beaufain Street were then surveyed and mapped out in a Grand Model (Figure 2). Utilizing the central square commonly identified with Philadelphia, this plan divided the peninsula into the deep, narrow lots characteristic of seventeenth century British colonial towns (Reps 1965). In a rare moment of foresight, the Lord Proprietors wrote,

We hope you give all possible incouragement to ye building of Charles Towne at the Oyster point as we formerly directed. Which if it once arrive to any considerable number of Inhabitants will draw a plentifull Trade and be a great security to ye whole settlement (Salley 1928:105).

Others readily agreed with this judgement. In 1680, an enthusiastic observer marvelled,

The cituation of this Town is so convenient for public Commerce that it rather seems to be the design of some skilfull Artist than the accidentall position of nature (Mathews 1954:153).

The port of Charleston soon became an important link in Great Britain's vast commercial network. Agriculture and the fur trade conducted with the neighboring Indians were the mainstays of the young colony's bourgeoning economic structure. As the fur trade expanded, deerskins became the major commodity exported from Charleston. Ranging from approximately 55,000 to over 100,000 in each shipment, the quantity of deerskins involved created a need for extensive storage facilities. The retreat inland of the Indian tribes following the Yamassee War (1715-1716) combined with the problem of storage to transform this trade from a secondary pursuit of those planters who dealt directly with the Indians to a capital intensive industry operated by the town's mercantile community. In order to profitably dispose of the skins, the merchants of Charleston developed contacts in England who handled the sale of the furs. The Englishmen in turn supplied the Charlestonians with the trade goods needed for their dealings with the Indians (Earle and Hoffman 1977:37).

The stability of the area surrounding Charleston encouraged the colonists in their search for a staple crop. In the early eighteenth century, rice was recognized as a potentially lucrative crop for the Carolinians. By the 1730's, rice had become the predominant export of South Carolina. For the period 1724-1774, the rice shipped from the colony accounted for from one-half to two-thirds of the total value of the province's exports. Indigo, following a late start in the 1740's was second and the products of the backcountry - provisions, lumber and naval stores - were third (Earle and Hoffman 1977:38).

The commercial prosperity of Charleston and its role as an administrative center created a need for a news and advertising medium. The Carolinians's first attempt to entice a printer to settle in Charleston occurred in 1722 when Francis Yonge, the colony's agent in England, was instructed to,

procure by the first opportunity, a Printer with his Tools to be sent to this Province and Draw Bills for the sum that shall be agreed with the said Printer (Cohen 1953:3).

Nine years later, the offer of a bounty of a thousand pounds succeeded in luring a printer to Charleston. On January 8, 1732, Thomas Whitmarsh publised the first issue of the <u>South Carolina Gazette</u>, a newspaper which was to continue, under various owners, for forty five years.

The South Carolina Gazette gave the current price of local commodities, the entrance and clearance of ships as well as foreign and local news. Subscriptions and advertisements were the Gazette's main sources of income. Subscribers were apparently spread throughout the British possessions in the New World as well as the mother country. Items from the newspaper were frequently reprinted in other publications in the colonies and England; the consistent appearance in the "Gentlemen's Magazine" of articles drawn from the South Carolina Gazette make it evident that the newspaper served as one of the English magazine's major sources of information about the southern colonies (Cohen 1953:10). In 1764, Peter Timothy, then editor of the newspaper, published a list of locations where subscriptions would be accepted which included not only every settlement of the slightest importance in South Carolina but also several towns in North Carolina, Georgia and the Floridas (Gazette, 25 August 1764). These non-Charlestonians also took advantage of the advertising columns in the Gazette; runaway slaves and indentured servants, missing heirs and various other items were frequently the subjects of notices inserted in the newspaper.

As the voice of Charleston's mercantile community and a representative of the southern colonies, the South Carolina Gazette played an integral role in the commercial affairs of the port city. Because of this, a study was conducted of the advertisements of merchants and craftsmen in the South Garolina Gazette to provide a data base for the determination of trends in the location of Charleston businesses. Advertising soon became a common practice of merchants in Charleston (Table 1). Most of the members of the town's mercantile community advertised consistently, although Gabriel Manigault and Henry Laurens, two of the more established merchants, did not.

During the first decade of Charleston's existence, the captains of ocean-going vessels had to use lighters to carry their goods to the town's docks. In the 1690's, however, those areas deep enough for large ships were converted into wharves (Green 1965:12)(see Figure 2) while the other areas along the Bay became fashionable residential quarters. The development of wharves and streets significantly lowered lightering and hauling charges for the merchants. Buildings were erected upon the wharves and proved to be ideal locations for both the storehouses needed for the colony's exports and outlets for the sale of imports. The Charleston merchants clustered on major east-west thoroughfares adjacent to the wharves (Figure 3). East Bay and Broad Street, two of the principal streets delineated in the Grand Model, were highly valued for their proximity to the waterfront. For the period 1732 - 1737, of the eighty six merchants who gave specific street addresses, 36.0% were located on the Bay, 20.0% on Broad and 14.1% on the various wharves. Elliot Street was the site of 9.4%, while



Areas of former marsh in the peninsular city; note the area of narrow marsh and high ground on the bay between Cumberland and Water Streets; this was the logical location for the wharves.





note the clustering of settlement near Broad and the Bay; growth west towards the Ashley (Roberts and Toms 1739) 8.24% listed Church and 4.71% Tradd Street. This pattern holds true, with slight variations, for the entire period studied (Table 2),

Local competition and the large scale of the merchants' operations made it essential that overhead expenses be kept as low as possible; easy access to both imported goods and those intended for export as well as the cost of transportation withing the city itself were necessary considerations. A notice published in an issue of the South Carolina Gazette in 1750 stated the rates for carriage of all goods from the wharves or bridges before the Bay of Charleston:

To any part of Church Street and other places leading thereto between the bridge that leads to Colleton's Square, for every cord of wood, load of boards, plank, timber and bricks, computing 500 feet of inch or other boards, plank and timber in proportion, and 500 bricks, to a load, 5 shillings currency.

If over the bridge and to White Point, or over the bridge and to Colleton's Square on a parallel with Church Street, 7 shillings and 6 pence and for every load of lime 2 pence per bushel.

To any part of Meeting Street, and other places leading thereto, between the bridge that leads to Mr. Hopton's and the bridge near Captain Simmons, 7 shillings & 6 pence.

And lime 3 pence per bushel.

To King Street and all other parts of town not hearin before mentioned, 10 shillings.

And lime for 4 pence per bushel.

To the barracks, 12 shillings & 6 pence.

For every load of gunpowder to and from the magazine 15 shillings.

For a full load of any other kind of goods (if a full load is required) at the like rates as for wood.

And for shingles to any part of the town 5 shillings per thousand. (South Carolina Gazette 9-16 July 1750).

In a similar list given in 1755, the rates are proportionately the same (SCG 19 May 1755). The publication of these schedules indicates the interest which the community had in transportation expenses within the town itself. The lack of cost quotations—for the conveyance of goods to those

streets, East Bay and Broad, which were utilized by merchants makes it evident that proximity to the waterfront was valued not merely for convenience but also economy.

The expanded economic base of the town permitted growth in population and a corresponding increase in the demand for service industries. Artisans had a different criteria than that of merchants for their choices of locations. Although access to raw materials was important, a more serious consideration was proximity to customers. There were some, such as coopers and sail makers, who preferred sites on or as close to the waterfront as possible. Others spread throughout the city. Of the forty seven craftsmen who gave their addresses in the advertisements published in the South Carolina Gazette from 1732-1737, 18.7% were on Church, 16.6% on Broad, 14.5% on Elliot and 12.5% on Tradd Street. Only 8.3% were located on the Bay. 6.2% were situated each on Bedons' Alley and the Green while the wharves, White Point and Union Street each had 4.1%. This lack of clustering continues throughout the next thirty years, with the addition of King Street as an important area for artisans (Table 3, Figure 4).

The development and increased prosperity of Charleston resulted in a rise in the cost of renting and buying real estate within the commercial core of town. Significant portions of the artisan community dispersed throughout Charleston as all but the more affluent craftsmen were forced from the highly desirable locations. Many small businessmen attempted to combat rising real estate prices by sharing buildings while artisans made increasing use through time of the more peripheral King and Meeting Streets, two thoroughfares largely ignored by merchants. Craftsmen who derived their livelihood from such trades as the slaughtering of livestock, soap making and tallow chandlery, needed space. The lack of sanitation and the danger of fire made these activities the subject of nuisance persecution. Artisans plagued by these complaints and worried about the increased cost of land within the commercial core tended to move from the economic center of the town to less congested areas of the periphery.

Due to the demands of trade, Charleston's mainstay, the locations of merchants and craftsmen are important indications of movement within a community. In Charleston during the years 1732 - 1767, both merchants and, to a lesser extent, artisans utilized more intensively those streets which ran east-west rather than those which were on a north-south axis, and physical growth during this period is primarily to the west, towards the Ashley River. There is, however, a substantial increase in the use of King Street by both these groups in the period 1738-1743. The subsequent decline in the years 1744-1749 for merchants (3.4% to 1.4%) and craftsmen (26.1% to 8.9%) is probably an indication of the overall economic stagnation of Charleston in the 1740's (Figure 5).

An international conflict, King George's War (1740-1748) severely disrupted the commerce of Charleston. Spanish and French privateers relentlessly preyed on British ships. As the prosperity of the town depended on the returns from the export of the heavy, bulky agricultural goods produced by the surrounding area, the impact was devastating.



note the continued westward growth; more intensive use of the core commercial area (Petrie 1788)



Insurance rates soared and many Charleston merchants suffered severe losses when their cargoes were captured. The increased freight rates cut into the merchants' profits to such a painful extent that, at several times during the conflict, Charleston merchants ignored the traditionally lucrative capture of enemy trade and instructed their privateers to concentrate on the destruction of their Spanish and French counterparts (Stumpf 1971:216-217).

The disruption of the commercial life of $\{$ harleston also affected the development of more peripheral areas, such as Meeting Street. Merchants did not locate their businesses on this street until 1762-1767, at which time it was the site of 2.6% of those who advertised with addresses in the South Carolina Gazette. Craftsmen, however, began utilizing this thoroughfare as early as 1750-1755 (2.1%) with an increase in 1756-1761 (7.2%) and slight decrease for the period 1762-1767 (5.2%).

The urban development of Charleston was a function of economic growth. Competition forced both merchants and craftsmen to consider their locations in terms of cost of transport, access to materials and convenience to customers. Their decisions reflect the demands of their businesses, such as space or accessibility to the waterfront, as well as the desires of their customers. There are, of course, biases inherent in the data utilized for this study. Those merchants who either did not require or could not afford to advertise are not represented; neither are those who omitted the names of specific streets or wharves. The large sample involved, however, as well as the important role of the South Carolina Gazette in the commercial life of the colony makes the information valid as an indicator of trends within the community.

CHAPTER III

CHARLESTON'S COMMERCIAL LANDSCAPE, 1803 - 1860

In 1817 Ebenezer Kellogg, a visitor to Charleston, wrote in his description of the city,

The whanves are all on the east side of the town, and do not indeed reach quite to the southern end, so that in coming into the harbour you see all the shipping at once. The town is laid out very regularly and the principal streets are Eastbay street running parallel and next to the east river, in which you find most of the ship chandlers, many of the great grocers, and in the stores between this and the docks, all the cotton and rice trade, the auction sales, and generally the shipping business. Parallel to Eastbay going to the west you find Church, Meeting, and King streets; the two last of which with Broad street that crosses them at right angles a little below the middle of the town, are the principal streets for elegant shops. West of King street, the town is less regular, the streets being mostly short. The streets running east and west commonly run quite across the town (Martin 1948:4) (Figure 6).

The economic life of Charleston revolved around the waterfront. It was here that the agricultural products of the surrounding plantations accumulated and were shipped to market; here was the destination of finished goods whose journey had begun in far-away, often exotic, ports. Factors, commission merchants, retailers - to all of those who dealt in exports and/or imports, East Bay and the wharves were ideal locations for their businesses. In 1807, Benj. Paul Williams, a factor and commission merchant, referred to "his new range of buildings, the corner of Cordes and Prioleau's Streets, opposite Prioleau's South Wharf, known as the 'Corner of Commerce'..." (Charleston Courier Jan. 1, 1807).

In 19th century Charleston a wharf was not merely a docking facility. Rather, it consisted of a dock and usually several buildings where merchandise could be stored, counted, and shipped or purchased. In 1803, John Champneys offered for sale,

My wharf, containing a front on Prioleau's Street 264', and extends as far as the channel of Cooper River; together with a long row of Brick stores, 105' by 32' - a large brick scale house and counting house (Charleston Courier July 15, 1803).

Dealers in merchandise not only profitted from the convenience of being in the commercial center of town, Broad and East Bay, but also by avoiding exorbitant cartage costs. Goods were often advertised at discount prices if the buyer would pick up his purchases on the wharf and demand neither delivery nor the elegance of a store.


Transportation was not merely an expense but, at times, a major difficulty for Charlestonians. Throughout the period 1803 - 1860, Charleston was a city of pedestrians; horse cars were not used in the city until the post-bellum era. For the individual, this seldom posed a hardship. The outer edges of the

built-up area of the town were never, in any direction, more than one and a fourth miles from the commercial center. A stroll down the entire length of Meeting or King Street in the built-up section would have entailed only one and a half miles (Figures 7 - 9). This made it entirely feasible to live within any part of the city and still be within walking distance of all the major business districts (Radford 1974:177) (Figure 9). In 1859, William Calder of Calder House, formerly the well-known Planters' Hotel, on the corner of Queen and Church, gave notice that his building was for rent. In his advertisement, he emphasized,

The location is one of the most desirable in the City, being within five minutes' walk of the Wholesale Houses, the Wharves, Banks and Postoffices, and is, on this account, convenient for the Country Merchant, the Planter and the Stranger on a visit of pleasure (Charleston Courier May 2, 1859).

Although the individual would find it relatively comfortable to traverse the city, the movement of goods from one location to another was not as simple. Flooding and bad roads were facts of life in Charleston. In 1818, an article in the Charleston Courier lamented,

DRY GOODS - But few sales have been made the past week, owing in part to the heavy rains, which has made it almost impossible for the transportation of goods even from one part of the city to another, and for country traders to come to market....

The article, concluding on an optimistic note, cheerily reported,

the article is improving, and many sales would probably have been effected had it not been for the inclemency of the weather (Charleston Courier Feb. 2, 1818).

Two technological innovations, the steam ship (1819) and the railroad ("Best Friend" - 1830) failed to remedy the situation. The steam ship merely increased the importance of transporting goods to the wharves; the railroad, due to internecine competition among the more powerful factions of the business community, terminated on the Neck, between King and Meeting Streets, and was not extended into the built - up area of the city (Figure 7).

Transportation difficulties and the desire for proximity to the waterfront resulted in a heavy concentration of retailers, factors, and commission merchants on the wharves and East Bay (See Table 6). Although in the study which was conducted, these two locations were considered separately, they should be grouped together in order to form a more realistic understanding of the economic importance of the area.

In his dissertation, "Charleston, South Carolina, Merchants, 1815 - 1860: Urban Leadership in the Antebellum South," Gregory Allen Greb asserted,

Of far greater impact on the trade patterns of the state (and certainly of Charleston) during this early period was the introduction of steamboats in 1819. After that date, river steamers replaced 'waggoners' as the principal carriers of upland produce and cotton, and East Bay wharves replaced King Street retail shops as the main center of business activity (Greb 1978:82).

Patterns of growth and development in Charleston, 1704 - 1852





Figures 10 - 19

Data compiled from the newspapers contradicts Greb's statement. Although the introduction of steamboats increased or, at least, maintained the commercial importance of East Bay and the wharves, it is also probable that the location of the railroad terminus, between King and Meeting on the Neck, helped promote the desirability of King Street as a location for retailers. This could account for the fact that East Bay and the wharves combined show the heaviest concentration of retailers until the period 1845 - 1850, when King Street becomes predominant (Figures 10 - 19).

There is an additional factor, however, which could explain the discrepancy between Greb's evidence and that accumulated from the advertisements in the the Charleston Courier, 1803 - 1860. As the market system of Charleston matured and became increasingly sophisticated, there developed a greater specialization in terms of occupational classification. There was an increasing trend to advertise as an individual engaged in a specific type of business rather than employing the generic sobriquet of merchant. There was also a greater specialization in terms of merchandise offered for sale. This could have resulted in a slight bias against East Bay and the wharves as those dealing exclusively in slaves were not included. The widely diversified stock of 18th century stores still existed but, throughout the antebellum period, there was an increasing trend toward stores devoted to the sale of specific items. Stores dealing solely in books and stationary, medicines, clothing or boots and shoes proliferated throughout the period studied. Nevertheless, few merchants hesitated to add something unrelated to their usual stock in trade. This made it difficult to classify a Paint and Oil Store, which also advertised mustard, as simply a store dealing in paints and oils. For this reason, retailers were considered as a whole and not divided into different types. Occupations were, however, separated. The addition of the numbers of such professions as factors and commission merchants might significantly alter the percentages of businesses on East Bay and the wharves and King Street.

The character of King Street, the other scene of a heavy concentration of retailers, changed dramatically from the 18th to the 19th century. By the 1770s, approximately 3,000 wagons a year came to Charleston (Earle and Hoffman 1977: 36) and, throughout the late 18th and early 19th centuries, wagon yards were a common sight on this section of King Street (Charleston City Directories 1790 - 1816).

King Street rapidly gained in importance and elegance. In 1854, Charles Fraser marvelled in his Reminiscences,


King Street, now so attractive, with its gorgeous windows and dazzling display of goods emulating a Turkish bazaar, and inviting them (the ladies) to a daily promenade, was then chiefly occupied by hucksters, pedlars and tavern keepers (Fraser 1854:12 - 13).

For the period 1805 - 1810, King Street was the location of only 4.87% of the merchants who advertised in the <u>Charleston Courier</u>. During this period, six areas - the wharves, East Bay, Broad, Tradd, Elliott, and Queen Streets - had higher concentrations of retailers. By 1810 - 1815, however, King Street had 8.58%, and only three locations - the wharves, East Bay and Broad Streets - had a greater number of retailers. There is a steady increase and, by the period 1825 - 1830, King Street was the location of 24.47% of the retailers, the highest percentage shown on any location. The commercial importance of King Street remains consistent throughout the remainder of the period studied.

Relative percentages of merchants and others on Charleston's major thoroughfares.









1805-1806 There is a distinct decrease in the number of businesses south of Broad for the period 1805 - 1860, as compared to the 18th century. In the 1700s, Tradd, Church and Elliott Streets were commercially important (Calhoun et al 1983:4). From 1805 - 1820, however, the percentages of businesses on Tradd reveal a steady decline of the commercial use of this street. Tradd only appears again in 1830 - 1835 with .33% of the retailers. Church and Elliott Streets are insignificant in terms of retail businesses for the entire period 1805 - 1860. All three of these streets fared better with the members of the craftsmen and others category (See Table 7). Church Street, for example, had a small but significant number of craftsmen throughout the years surveyed. The rather amorphous group of craftsmen and others, however, contains a wide range of occupations and, although craftsmen are clustered on King Street, was dispersed throughout the city. The primary businessmen located on Broad Street were lawyers and auctioneers. Very little of even this type of business, however, was conducted south of Broad Street (Figure 20).

In the antebellum period, residential and work places became increasingly differentiated. As Charleston expanded, the central business district evolved with a relatively small intrusion of residential areas (Goldfield 1982:86). This segregated land use was also reflected in the development of residential districts (Figure 9). By 1859 and 1860, 83% of the wholesale merchants, one of the elite branches of the mercantile profession, who were listed in both the Federal Census and either the 1859 or 1860 city directory lived south of Calhoun Street. Planters' residences formed three major clusters; these were, in order of numerical importance: south of Broad, including most of the southern tip of the peninsual; the northwest section of the city, in Harleston and Cannonsborough; scattered along the east of the city, from Hampstead to Rhettsbury (Radford 1974:155) (Figure 20).

The upper class, made up primarily of planters, successful professionals, and wealthy merchants, largely preferred residences within sight and sound of St. Michaels Episcopal Church. There were several reasons for this choice. St. Michaels was a prestigous church; a large number of Charleston's wealthiest class worshipped there every Sunday. The bells of St. Michaels tolled the hour and were used to raise the town in case of fire or disaster. A sentry stationed on the steeple called out the quarter hours as they struck, maintained a fire watch and, if a fire was seen, not only made sure the bells were rung but also would hang a warning light on the side of the spire nearest to the fire. In a city frequently assaulted by fire and terrified of arson by slaves, the ability to hear the bells and see the warning light was a great comfort. The other three corners of the intersection of Broad and Meeting were occupied by the Guard House, Court House, and City Hall. These four corners were the physical embodiment of social control in Charleston (Radford 1974:194 - 195).


The residents of the area surrounding St. Michaels were intent on maintaining the health and safety of their district. Charlestonians had a morbid fear of fire and disease. Following the disasterous fire of 1838, the city council passed an ordinance requiring all buildings constructed in the peninsular city south of Calhoun Street, which was at this time the northern boundary, to be of brick (Radford 1974:197 - 199). Charlestonians also embarked on a crusade to clean up the alleys in the central area. In this period, it was still believed that bad air caused disease, while sea breezes were considered a helpful, if not always completely effective, tonic. As alleys packed with the shacks of lower class whites, mulattoes, and blacks - both slave and free - were believed to be an impediment to the cleansing sweep of sea breezes,



cesspools of disease, fire hazards, and general nuisances, it is not surprising that, time after time in the antebellum era, the "better class" petitioned to have these alleys cleaned, widened, and, in terms of both filth and people, cleared out (Radford 1974:201 - 202).

In their search for inexpensive housing, the people dispossessed by such maneuvers were pushed out of the central area into the outskirts. By 1859 and 1860, manual workers and those considered destitute were largely concentrated in the north and, to some extent, east of the city (Radford 1974:153). Many of these people chose to live on the Neck, the area north of Calhoun Street, a notorious bastion of inexpensive housing which was not annexed by the city of Charleston until 1850.

Upper class citizens of antebellum Charleston took further precautions to protect their favorite residential section. Those who lived in the area were largely in control of the property market. There was a further constraint on the introduction of foreign or undesirable elements into this district; most of the homes within sight and sound of St. Michaels remained within the family and were seldom offered for sale to outsiders (Radford 1974:192 - 196).

By the antebellum era, Charleston was a "closed" city (Rogers 1980). Although wharves spread northward as the city expanded, the commercial core, East Bay and Broad, which had been established in the 18th century, retained its dominant position in the comercial life of the city. King Street gained in commercial importance as thoroughfares in the area around St. Michaels lost proportionately. The institutional and symbolic core of the town was protected by the determination of its residents to preserve the convenience, prestige, health and safety of the central area of Charleston. Lower class occupants and businesses were forced out of this central district by high rents and the destruction of alley housing.

The growth of antebellum Charleston was determined by residential patterns and the importance of the waterfront to the commercial life of Charleston. The city which had previously expanded on an east-west axis (Figure 21), realligned itself to flow north-south. The Civil War did little to disturb these deeply imbedded trends.


Charleston's retail commercial core, 1800 - 1860

CHAPTER IV

CONCLUSIONS

In the early 1700s, Charleston became the major port in the southeast of what would become the United States. The products of the province of Carolina furs, naval stores, rice and indigo - commanded a ready market in Europe. As the receiving and distribution point for the southeastern region, Charleston soon assumed economic, institutional and social significance.

Merchants flocked to the growing town as goods flowed to and from the port. These merchants clustered on East Bay and Broad Streets, the two major east-west thoroughfares adjacent to the wharves. During the years 1732 - 1737, of the eighty six merchants who gave specific street addresses, 36.0% were located on the Bay, 20.0% on Broad and 14.1% on the various wharves. Elliott Street was the site of 9.4%, while 8.24% listed Church and 4.71% Tradd Street. This pattern, with slight variations, held true from 1732 - 1767 (Calhoun et al 1983:4 - 5).

As merchants were attracted by the sweet scent of profit, planters were enticed to the rapidly expanding town by the need to conduct business, obtain finished products and enjoy the society which the plantation system held at a distance. These planters frequently established residences in Charleston in which they would pass the summer months while fevers ravaged the countryside. Some planters were only able to rent quarters; others indulged their taste for the grandiose and built large, striking homes for their families. Although these planters generally chose lots near the water for the reputed health benefits, they were also influenced by wealth and taste in their decisions (Zierden and Calhoun 1982:16). Some, particularly the rice planters in the mid 1700s, situated themselves along the Battery (Oakes 1982:10) but others, preferring more spacious lots, spread themselves along the Ashley and Cooper Rivers (Zierden and Calhoun 1982:16).

The establishment of Charleston as a social center stabilized the economy of Charleston, although it offered few opportunities for expansion. The economic well-being of the town depended on the prosperity of the agrarian community for which it was the focal point. In the prosperous years of the 18th century, Charleston gained in wealth, culture, and population. The planters' financial success created a demand for service industries. Craftsmen generally spread throughout the city, following their customers in an attempt to lure them to trade through convenience if nothing else. Of the forty seven craftsmen who gave their addresses in the advertisements published in the South Carolina Gazette from 1732 - 1737, 18.7% were on Church, 16.6% on Broad, 14.5% on Elliott, and 12.5% on Tradd. Only 8.3% were located on the Bay. 6.2% were situated each on Bedon's Alley and the Green while the wharves, White Point and Union Street each had 4.1%. This lack of clustering continues throughout the next thirty years, with the addition of King Street as an important area for artisans (Calhoun et al 1983:16).

Eli Whitney's invention of the cotton gin radically changed agriculture

in the southern United States. Sea island cotton, a geographically limited crop grown only on the islands, was now supplemented by a short staple cotton which could be grown throughout much of the South. Although rice and lumber remained important commodities for trade, cotton soon became the region's major export. Europe voraciously demanded cotton for its textile mills and the South hastened to comply. Planters, delighted by the profit realized by the sale of cotton, rapidly converted much of their acreage which had been devoted to indigo to this new crop and preferred to buy provisions rather than waste valuable land on foodstuffs.

The years 1795 - 1815 were a time of unbridled prosperity for Charleston. A large mercantile community developed to deal in both exports and imports. The businessmen of Charleston were well aware of the need for a newspaper which could disseminate price and market information, serve as an advertising medium, and function as both creator and defender of Charleston's image (Goldfield 1982:86). In 1802, A.S. Willington and Loring Andrews came to Charleston with the intention of publishing a daily paper. Upon arrival, they discovered that W. Cullen Carpenter, an Englishman, had already come to Charleston with a similar goal (Stoney 1948:37). The three joined forces and the Charleston Courier, which soon became the spokesman for the business community of Charleston, was born.

Advertisements from this newspaper were surveyed in order to ascertain the locational trends of merchants and others from 1803 - 1860 and provide a data base to which information compiled from the colonial papers of Charleston could be compared. As the market economy of Charleston grew and matured. an increasing specialization in both profession and merchandise offered for sale became evident in the advertisements. For this reason, an attempt was made to separate retailers from other types of merchants. Those dealing exclusively in slaves and shipping were completely excluded. Although some members of the mercantile community either did not choose or could not afford to advertise, a large enough number did to give validity to the use of these advertisements in an effort to discover the locations of various commercial groups. A much smaller number of craftsmen advertised during the period 1803 -1860 than might have been expected. As in the 18th century, those who did were dispersed throughout the city. Although King Street had the greatest concentration of craftsmen, Meeting Street had an erratic, yet significant, number of artisans in contrast to its virtual insignificance in the 18th century. The small number of craftsmen as intimated by the newspaper advertisements is probably a result of the perceived lack of respect for the white artisan and his subsequent removal to more hospitable climes. The figures also might reflect a dependence on slaves for both skilled and unskilled manual labor.

Certain trends already established by merchants in the 18th century persist throughout the antebellum period. It remained extremely important to locate near the waterfront. East Bay and the wharves acted as magnets to retailers, factors, and commission merchants. While retailers concentrated on the waterfront from 1805 - 1845, King Street, a relatively insignificant thoroughfare throughout the 18th century, was rapidly gaining in commercial importance. From 1845 - 1860, King Street had the largest number of retailers' businesses and a significant number of the artisans who advertised in the Charleston Courier. As the town spread, its growth shifted from an east—west to a north-south axis. There was a corresponding decrease in the commercial importance of east-west thoroughfares, except for Broad Street. Broad Street attracted a number of professionals, with a high concentration of lawyers and

auctioneers. This clustering was probably a result of these professionals' desire to be in close proximity to both the commercial core, East Bay and Broad, and the institutional center, Broad and Meeting. There is a significant decrease in the number of businesses located south of Broad. This was a result of residential patterns which were established in response to the upper class' desire for homes located in the relatively healthy, safe and prestigous central area of Charleston.

Craftsmen continued to locate on many of the same secondary streets they had utilized in the 18th century. From 1805 - 1860, a small but revealing number of artisans were located on Church Street and the utilization of Queen Street increased throughout the period. In contrast, State Street was the location of very few craftsmen although there was a clustering of brokers on this relatively unimportant thoroughfare.

The commercial community continued to advertise throughout both good years and bad. The bonanza years of 1795 - 1819 were a victim of the national depression which began in 1819 (Greb 1978:18). This brought to an abrupt halt the commercial expansion of Charleston. Few merchants survived the 1820s (Greb 1978:27) and, although the economy of Charleston stabilized thereafter, the city had begun a steady decline from which the "golden" antebellum years could not save it. The cotton planters and merchants of Charleston had learned to their horror that dependence upon cotton and its international market made the local economy vulnerable to fluctuations over which they could exercise no control. Competition with newer cotton growing areas in the south and southwest further cut into the economic well-being of Charleston.

The prosperity of Charleston was irrevocably linked to that of the agrarian system she served. Although antebellum Charleston remained the most important port in the southeast, the success of railroads and steam exacerbated her economic recession and encouraged the growth of rivals. Charleston slowly withdrew into herself. Attacked by northern abolitionists and increasingly fearful of competition from her southern sister cities, the businessmen of Charleston fought hard to retain the supremacy of their city. It was a battle doomed from the start.
